It is a very special place filled with teachers who can encourage and support your development. You are very lucky to have this support, make the most of your resources you have at this time. A particular teacher here had quite an effect on me during my time at the College and without her support and guidance I don't believe I would have chosen the career path I am on today. The College should be congratulated on all the work they do in installing the right values and beliefs in all of you to ensure you will reach your full potential.

Seven years ago, I was sitting in your position, a Year 12 ready to embark on my final year of my secondary education. I was feeling nervous, excited, anxious and the pressure of what the year was going to hold. I encourage you all to knuckle down at this time and try your best in everything you do, you will be rewarded for your efforts in your results you achieve. Having a vision is a very important part in this, setting goals and ticking them off as you go throughout the year will install you with a sense of resilience and passion whilst setting foundations for your future.

I can say to you today, keep at it, you will overcome these challenges and be stronger for it. Your journey is all about growth and you can only learn by going through these experiences. Also, not just moving away from home but you will need to adapt to a whole different mechanism of learning. Like most of you here today, I was a high achiever in my secondary schooling but upon commencing university this was not the case. You will go from being one of the best, to being average at best. This can often be demoralizing and dampen your excitement of your new journey. At these times always remember your goals and aspirations to strive to. You don't need to be the best or receive the awards you just need to do the best you can do and make yourself proud.

At university I was often told the story of the person who received High Distinctions in everything he attempted. At the end of the day this person was not employable in the workforce as he may have been very smart but did not possess the people skills to succeed in his industry. I have always kept this balance in the forefront of my mind. It is not only your intellectual skills that will assist you in achieving your goals but the skills you are developing day by day and your interactions with everyone you meet will build your character and develop you into that person you need to be to accomplish your goals.

I can truly say this is what I aimed for during my study and can reinforce with you that balance is the key. And now, after five and a half years of study I have achieved two degrees. There were moments where I may have felt it was not possible. Amongst the countless exams, tests, assignments and sleepless nights never lose sight of the passion which is driving you to continue.

Today, I am a practicing lawyer, at a law firm in Adelaide. I am living my dream in my current field of family law. I have a passion for helping people and this field for me is very rewarding yet every day challenges me with a new and unexpected adventure.



I also helped out in the Library when required and for a short time I was the Oc Health person. The move of the Boarding House from Crystal Brook to Port Pirie in 2007 was a major event. It was quite controversial at the time but the boarders have enjoyed many benefits from being located on the College grounds.

Some of my favourite memories are of our Quiz Nights which involved boarders and teachers. Often they had a theme and students and teachers dressed up. I have enjoyed a wonderful working relationship, spanning 16 years, with Denise and David Arbon. Janet writes:

I started teaching in 1973 in Whyalla and spent eight years working for the Education Department.

My teaching career at St Marks College started in 1986 and during that time have seen many major changes to the College.

During that time I have worked as a teacher in many different subject areas undertaking various roles within the College.

Extracurricular activities included coordinating the St Mark's netball for many years and giving me an opportunity to meet many parents which formed into life-long friendships. Memories return of this period of time working with a very enthusiastic worker and supporter in Father Dennis Handley.

The biggest impact on the College was the changes from having four separate campuses to what exists today. Memories return of the huge moving day at the closing of Gertrude Street, shifting the senior school to Bosco, when trucks and people transferred furniture and resources from one to the other all to be ready to start the next week.

Not only the College changed but so has Home Economics. My early experiences here was teaching in a dated transportable with 4 stoves and 6 sewing machines. As the only Home Economics teacher I shared the centre with the many mice that liked to visit and was responsible for shopping and cleaning the facility. I remember one group of girls that thought the place could do with a good scrub. They arrived with scrubbing brushes and proceeded on their hands and knees to give the place a complete scrubbing. (They did prefer practical work over theory requirements).

Home Economics continued to grow and with that came additional teachers and a new centre. This has allowed the subject to develop and makes each day a pleasant working environment.

One of the main highlights of teaching in a Catholic school is attending the Year 12 Retreats. Over the last 30 years I have only missed two Retreats (usually attending as head cook). It is a very emotional experience as I remember them starting in Year 8 and over the next 5 years develop into mature, young adults. It is an experience that will always be with me.

My children, Verity, James and Alistair attended the College for all of their schooling and have many fond memories of sharing our Sunday evening with Betty Prest and Father Ray Cau. They have all moved on and it is a delight spending time with their families, especially my grandchildren. This year has renewed my connections with the Benedict Campus as my granddaughter Zara started in Reception, therefore creating new links.

The 31 years have been eventful, rewarding and have added to my faith journey, and the care and support the College has offered to me and my family will always bring back fond memories.
