

Kali Rodda spoke at the Old Scholar Reunion about the special memories from the Class of 2008.

When Greg approached me on Monday about speaking here tonight, I asked if there was anything in particular he'd like me to speak about. He said yeah... I'll email you something. I thought great, that will be really helpful but upon opening the email I read a list of generic questions like 'what are you doing now?' 'do you have any connection with the College?" describe the experience of coming back to the school today'.... These questions probably weren't designed for an ex-student who's ended up teaching at the very place we left 10 years ago, ecstatic to never have to attend another day of school ever again. Yet here I am, working at St Mark's, sitting across the staffroom table from those teachers who confiscated jewellery from me and told me I talked too much.

It certainly doesn't feel like 10 years ago that we graduated. In some ways it feels like we never left. It's not until I catch myself saying things like 'when I was at school' that I realise just how long it has been. Having said this, I still remember a lot about my time here at St Mark's, I have a lot of fond memories and I'd like to think that my experiences here at the College helped equip me with vital skills needed to succeed in any path I chose. There are still teachers here now that nurtured me through some tough times and helped me succeed. I had no idea that I would go on to become a teacher, but subconsciously l think it was those teachers that inspired me to take this career path. To one day have that same impact on a student, that they had on me.

I think I speak on behalf of everyone when I say just how amazed we are at how the school has changed and a little in awe at all the incredible new facilities. Especially considering all 100+ students in our graduating class asked, begged, even prayed for a microwave in our study room, to no avail. Little old Room 15, now known as M1... The study room was quite an ironic name really. It was always a struggle to multitask between school work and chatting on MSN, making sure not to use 'lol' or 'rofl' in our assignments. The novelty of laptops being released with webcams was also a major distraction. Not to mention the horrible Chuck Norris jokes from Mr Ryan and the pressure of having the latest and greatest background on MySpace.

On a more serious note, I think one of the fondest memories I have of our senior year, and perhaps one of the most defining experiences in my teenage years, was the Year 12 Retreat. The new friendships formed, the old friendships strengthened and the comradery from all was really something else. I remember, and I'm sure you all do to, teachers always telling us to enjoy being young, to enjoy school, and to make the most of it. I never really gave it much thought at the time, and I can tell you from being on the other side of this conversation now, that students still don't give this much thought. When I look back now, I realise Year 12 really was one of the best years. I feel very privileged for the group I got to share it with, we were a close knit bunch, and I often wonder if this is a common thing across year levels or if we really were a part of something special. But for years after, I found myself wishing I could go back and do it all again.

A lot has changed since we were last here. The library is new, the IT centre is new, the Art and Tech centre is new, the chapel has moved, the BGC has changed, the Trade Skills centre is new, the Ag Centre and McNally Farm have expanded, but most recently the new spectacular double court gym and STEM Centre. If you have any connections with students at the College now, be sure to tell them you gave the elevator a spin... they'll be most envious. Perhaps most upsetting of all the changes is that the beloved Year 12 walk way no longer exists. On a more exciting note, would you believe that Gallagher have won the past 5 Sports Days. It seems so much has changed, but on some accounts, it's like nothings really changed at all. I still get the same friendly greeting from Sir each morning, the same warm smile from Miss Russack that can improve your mood in an instant, the same genuine conversations from Mr Sheridan that make you feel like your wellbeing is his priority, Mr Scav still uses his laser pointer, Mrs Congdon still has her 3 rules, number 1 being that she is always right, and number 3 being that if she is in fact not right, refer back to rule number 1. Mr Fantinel still uses the same terrible joke about how students should be writing so fast that smoke comes off their page, Gibbo is still quite literally run off his feet and Mrs Gibson is still the tough nut we remember, who wants nothing but the best from us all.

Since leaving school 10 years ago, some of us went on to further studies, some got a trade, some of you have travelled the world, some of you are engaged, some of you are married, some of you have your own children, a lot of us have fur babies, some of you own your own business, some of you have bought a house or investment property.. or maybe even two. Regardless of our achievements, the fact that we are now independent adults surviving in the real word is a feat in itself, considering 10 years ago a large number of us were forgetting the codes to our lockers, misplacing our diaries, and letting the dog eat our homework.

Tonight is a great opportunity to catch up, reflect and reminisce... Not to compare achievements, but rather, share our stories and experiences. I know I'm certainly inspired by some of the things that you've all gone on to do since 2008. Maybe I'm getting sentimental in my old age, but I think everyone would agree that today has been a fantastic opportunity for us all and I'm certainly glad I came. I'd like to thank the teachers for taking the time to share in this experience with us, for showing us around and allowing us to visit a place that was once so important to us.

So here's to us; the Class of '08'.

A new Science Centre has been built. It replaces facilities that are 25 years old and, in our planning, we made a commitment to make this a 'state of the art' contemporary facility built for exciting scholarship and exceptional learning. When we all walked for the first time into the John Mullin Science Centre, we inhaled a breath just a little more deeply and held that breath. 
