Memories from 1979



Jack Keain spoke at the Old Scholars' Reunion about a very different time of schooling, the memories from the Class of 1979.

I started school here in 1973 as a 10 year old going into Year 6 at the then Salesian College here on the Terrace. At that stage there were four Catholic school campuses in Port Pirie. Fatima was the junior primary site, Gertrude Street was upper primary, the Girls High school was on Wandearah Road (which is now Benedict) and the boys attended at Bosco from Years 6 - 11.

My Year 6 class had about 20 boys. I immediately settled in here and felt right at home. I didn't realise it at the time but in my class I had a first cousin, a second cousin and 2 third cousins and pretty well the whole class came from Catholic families.

Back then there was about four Priests and one Brother, all from the Salesian Order, teaching us boys and living in the Residence which is now part of the Boarding House complex.

I remember about Salesian College was that the P+F held a yearly fete. These were exciting days for us kids with many activities we enjoyed. The most unique event would start the week before when about 4 or 5 old cars would be lined up in the schoolyard. At an allocated time during the fete teams of men would attack the old Holdens, Fords, Valiants or Volkswagons with sledgehammers smashing the crap out of them. I think the winner was the team that did the most damage in the given time. Perhaps that's one todays P+F could bring back it was great to watch!

Around 1975 the school became co-ed and was renamed St Mark's College. The girls came over and our year level was split into two classes. Two Good Samaritan Sisters also joined the teaching staff.

Facilities here were very basic, we had a very small library with second-hand books, a small science lab and very little sports equipment. Lunch and recess times were spent kicking the footy or soccer balls on the oval. Cricket or tennis was played in Summer. We wore our school uniforms for PE as there was no change rooms back then. There was Mass every day at about 8am before school and at least once a week a full school Mass.

Sometimes in summer we would go to the town

pool for swimming, the town students who nearly all rode pushbikes would ride there. Any others like myself who were country students and didn't have bikes would pile into the Priests old grey EH Holden station wagon and be ferried down for lessons. Sometimes we went out to the Napperby Scout Hall with the same arrangement and once we had a huge day riding out to Port Germein taking it in turn sharing the bikes carrying food and fishing gear.

In High School we began sharing Technical facilities with Pirie High and the old Technical College where the John Pirie Gym is now located. After classes we would have to walk back to school along the Terrace which seemed a very long walk at the end of the day for us worn out kids. Some of the memorable teachers from those days included Fr Pulis, Fr Cantamessa, Brother Wilson and Sister Leonard.

In Year 10 we all transferred to the Wandearah Road Campus to complete our education with Year 12 now being added to the curriculum. As a country student we travelled to school in the Yellow buses- who then weren't allowed by law to drop us at our private school. We had to be dropped off and picked up at Risdon Primary. I remember the choking smell of sulphur as we would walk along Drage Street before the large stack was built at the Smelters. I also remember getting swooped by the angry magpies which probably still happens today.

In Year 11 we were encouraged to learn old style ballroom dancing. Every Monday night we would gather in this hall and be taught the Waltz, the Military Two-Step, the Canadian Barn Dance and many more. Our teachers were Mr and Mrs Scott and Mr and Mrs Kutzer with some parents helping out and often telling us off for our lack of skills and interest.

In 1978 St Mark's took a huge leap forward when it purchased its first computer. We were very excited even though we didn't have a clue what a computer was and we thought we would all be learning to use it very soon. I never ended up clapping eyes on that computer and I think only one person who did use it was Mr John Cellotto, it remained a mystery to the rest of us.

Some of the well-known teachers from my senior

high school years were Fr Remmie, Fr Omara, Mr Nitsche and Fr Ray Cau. Fr Ray as he was known kept a cricket bat in the classroom for discipline and was known for giving troublesome students '6 of the best' on their backside which seemed to improve their attitude no end.

At that stage classrooms weren't air-conditioned but we saw major improvement when ceiling fans were installed. Students used to throw things at the fans, sometimes a pen a rubber or ruler even our ties all got chucked at the fans. I remember a young teacher Mr Robert Cronin catching us out as he stepped back into the classroom after being out for a while. He was nearly hit by a flying projectile flying off the fan blades. Needless to say he wasn't happy and went psycho with the feather duster, whacking a few of the troublemakers so hard the feather duster shattered.

Looking back over my school years here I remember all the good times we had and the many friends made. With the passing of over 40 years my grade has lost five of its students. Today I'd like to remember Lorreta Raftery. Peter Murphy, Joanna Sherry, Pauline Kerin and Pat Lauritsen who are all together in the big classroom in the sky. Most of our teachers have passed on to but some who are still with us include John Mullin, Merril Riechelt and of course Robert Cronin who still teaches here today.

It pleases me so much to drive past this school and see the growth of facilities at both campuses of the College. When I was a student here improvements were always talked about however nothing ever seemed to happen but the year after I left the classrooms here on the northern fence were all built and things began to improve.

I remember with fondness and gratitude the toil of the Priests, Nuns and Brothers who worked so hard to give us an education. These days I always get annoyed when their collective reputations are smeared in the media by the wrongdoings of a few. To them and to all my teachers I say thank you from the bottom of my heart.

I wish the teachers and staff of today all the best and thank you for organising this reunion. Jack Keain

Memories from 1999



Luisa Fetherstonhaugh (Keane) shared her memories from the Class of 1999 at the Old Scholars' Reunion.

I may have left school as a student 20 years ago but it turns out the school has never left me... St Mark's is very much a tradition and an institution in our family. My parents sent all four of us through St Mark's but there was only one year that we actually all attended together (1987 was the year I started Reception and my brother was in his final year) so between us all they were College parents for a long time. In addition to that there have been many other cousins, friends and relations who have also attended and my sister Katie is now a long standing member of staff along with a few of our 99ers Catherine, Greg and Bret. Over the last 20 years there have always been rellies or friends going through St Mark's who keep me in the loop of all the latest news and it has never really left the conversation in my life.

St Mark's also delivered me a husband in the form of Tyson also an old scholar, not that I knew him at school. It wasn't really on my radar to be checking out the Year 9 boys when I was in Year 12! I now enjoy attending the occasional pick up, Sports Day (where I still cheer for Polding), special Mass or assembly for my niece and nephew and it is great when I attend the school to see some familiar staff from my school days still there. I also have the pleasure now of working with other old scholars of the College, even though they are all younger than me and make me feel a bit old. Now that I have my own two boys we are attending the Mini Marks playgroups in the school holidays and soon it will be time to bring it all full circle and hopefully enrol my oldest to begin his school days here via the lovely Little Lions program and my days as a College parent will begin.

Now for a change of pace and on to the reminiscing....Walking into the school today I was transported to the year 1999 and could almost hear the sounds of Greenday's - Time of

Your Life playing in my head and instinctively thought about the location of my last locker and Caregroup. I wondered how we all managed to survive the Millenium Bug that everyone was so worried about...and almost expected to see Father Joe pop up with his camera and little black book. All the names of the iconic teachers of us 99ers ran through my head the likes of Mr Griffin and his satin shirts, Hobes reading the paper up the front instead of teaching Geography, Mrs Caddy who's smile never wavered, Mr Boyle and his one liners, Mr Bastock and his freewheeling views on life, Fr Ray who made sure we all knew we were the ugly ones and the list goes on. Mr Fantinel is particularly memorable for me being the only teacher to ever throw this nerdy/ goody two shoes out of a classroom, still not sure to this day what exactly I did but it gave Mr Ford a good laugh when he walked past and saw me sitting shell shocked on the steps of the transportable.

I am proud to be part of the small but special group of students who started in Reception back in 1987 and continued the journey right through together until we graduated in 1999. For those who remember Fatima Campus it was the 'little school or infant school' where we first learned what this school business was all about in an environment free of the 'big kids' and full of stories, games, songs, fun and some wonderful and nurturing teachers. The likes of Mrs Jordan, Sister Monica, Mrs Cheesman, Mrs Faulkner were some of the teachers who still bring a smile to my face to this day. As we moved on from infant school to primary school at Benedict Campus we met another crop of great teachers who moulded us further. Miss Ciufoli, Mrs Keain, Mr DePalma, Mr Celotto, Mrs Lacey. As our time at Benedict drew to a close there was a really strong feeling that we had been a part of a very special experience and we all felt like one great big school family. Commencing high school the 99ers experienced an influx of new students, largely boosted by the group affectionately referred to as the bumpkins who in turn used to call us leadheads. Our year level was now a talented but diverse bunch ready to tackle those important last few years of school. Bosco challenged us and drove us to embrace our own strengths and look to the future... Sport was always prominent in school life and camps and

socials always provided much needed distraction from school work and plenty of gossip.

Perhaps the greatest of the gifts that I have taken from my time at St Mark's are a beautiful group of friends who I am lucky enough to have formed friendships with that I am sure will last our lifetime. We love to share our girls trips or family getaways and have seen each other through the great highs and lows in our lives of which there of course have been many over 20 years. We often have a laugh remembering good times together here at school and when I asked the girls for some help to jog my memory on stories from school a flood of responses came back which had us all giggling, unfortunately most of them were totally inappropriate for public sharing. It scared me just how much I couldn't remember from school (Loren on the other hand remembers everything!)... However I guess it is 20 years later after all and we are getting to the time of life where it's essential to invest in a good eye cream.

The Class of 99 are now in our late 30s and despite our joints starting to creak we have all in our own ways achieved a great deal whether it be creating families of our own, exciting careers and professional success, sporting achievement, creative passions, travel or anything else that brings us happiness. St Mark's gave us a strong sense of community and helped us identify our own gifts to take out into the world. School at the time seems like the whole world but in reality it is just the foundation on which to build the rest of your life. St Mark's College was our first community and gave us all the education, support and values for a solid foundation on which to build our dreams and I'm sure holds a special place in our hearts and memories. I am excited to see all of the old scholars and staff here this evening, especially the 99ers as I missed our 10 year reunion due to living overseas and look forward to hearing about the last 20 years in your lives. I wish all the different 10 year groups a great catchup as you reminisce and reflect on your school days and share all your different paths in life. So let's all share our stories and enjoy a great night.....cheers to the next 10 years for the Class of 99!

Christopher plans to return to the UK in 2020 to further develop his creative skills.






