PAT Testing

Our Year 7, 8, 9 and 10 students are currently undertaking achievement tests in both literacy (reading comprehension) and numeracy. The data collected from the PAT tests will provide teachers with diagnostic information about your child's learning. It will enable teachers to track individual student progress and most importantly ensure that all students are moving forward.

In preparation for the new school year, staff will review the data, using their findings to create targeted adjustments in the curriculum to support areas of development. Further to this, the data collected will also be used during our end of year handover process, ensuring that your child's 2020 teachers are well informed about their literacy and numeracy skills.

Year 12 Exams

This week, our Year 12 students commenced their exams, with Biology being the first exam held on Monday. Over the coming week, students will be sitting the following exams:

Nutrition, Physics, Chemistry, Psychology, Specialist Mathematics, Mathematics Methods, General Mathematics, Modern History and Physical Education.

This year marks the last year PE students will be required to sit an examination, with a new form of assessment being introduced in 2020.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish all our Year 12 students the best of luck during this time. We wish you every blessing as you finish your formal schooling and begin the next exciting journey in your life.
