Student Leadership

I had a chance to share some time with the Bosco School Captains on a recent Sunday night. They had been to Mass that morning with their House Leaders and Coordinator Marg Congdon. They then ventured to Mary Knoll, a little property near Gladstone, for some fun and sharing and goal setting. It was a 'sleep

over 'and the Year 12s were full of energy and optimism. They didn't get a restful night's sleep. There were too many stories. I joined them for tea and we sat around for a couple of hours developing an awareness of their personal gifts and their vision for the year. These are impressive people. It's a bit humbling really when they talk about what is important and what they want to achieve. Our leaders certainly reflect the goodness in this place.

I had a chance to shake hands with Ruby Champion and Jack Rafanelli this week. They had just been appointed as School Leaders of Benedict. They seemed a little nervous, a little excited and clearly they had considered the responsibility of leadership at Benedict. The Year 6s had just completed a process of discernment and learning about leadership. They were guided well by their teachers. They looked at qualities and responsibilities, talents and opportunities. I am very confident that student leadership at Benedict is in good shape and much will happen.

The AGM of the Board - Tuesday 17 March

The College Board has now completed its 12 month governance period. At the Annual General Meeting on 17 March there will be a new Board created. I write with much gratitude for the contribution that was made by the Board and certainly to acknowledge how well they encouraged and guided me. I will write a formal report on the achievements of the year at the AGM. Business Manager, Jo Court, will open the financials and explain decisions and be accountable to the assembled AGM. I ask that you consider two things: Please attend the AGM. It is the formal gathering to describe the management of the school and it is stronger when our families attend. This



is a time where our community can ask for justification about spending, about learning direction and about our community emphasis. A second consideration is to ask if you would think about Board membership. There will be eight meetings in the year plus a subcommittee membership. (Finance and Buildings and Grounds, Uniform, Sport, Scholarship, Marketing, Salesian House, Policy). You will make a significant contribution to our St Mark's world with Board membership.

Boarders Parents Meeting

There is a meeting of Boarding Parents once a term on a Sunday night. As boarders are returning from their weekend at home, carrying laundered clothes and fresh sheets, and as parents are dropping off various young people from various car pools, a meeting occurs. The group gathers to discuss the life of the Boarding Home and the activities that have been going on in the school. The group discusses concerns and offers suggestions. I get a chance to tell them some of the things that inspire. I suspect that sometimes adolescent children don't detail explanations

with my enthusiasm. The parents offer ideas and we build that most important trust and relationship. Boarders' Parent Meetings seem so important to me.

Little Lions

Ten Little Lions arrived at the school last week. There were ten excited, overwhelmed, innocent and determined children ready to start their transition into school life. They seemed so small and so fragile but very soon they were embraced by the confidence and skill of Ms Teresa Gadaleta who assured them that everything would be okay. The Little Lions program invites preschool children into the College for a couple of hours in the preceding two terms before they begin Reception. It has become one of our feature offerings for new families. The children are given a chance to gain confidence and learn about a new world. It ensures that the Reception experience is even better. I congratulate the educators involved and thank the parents for their trust.
