

We share a 200 year old legacy, a moment of reflection, a Confirmation and a Ministerial tour of the grounds.

A Feast Day and 200 Years of Catholic Education

It was the feast of Our Lady Help of Christians last week and we gathered as a community to celebrate a Eucharist together. This is a tradition amongst Salesian schools throughout the world. We go to Mass together throughout the world. It's a big day for Salesian schools worldwide and we acknowledged working within the spirit of Don Bosco and celebrating our special ethos. It became a great day together. What was also happening around Australia was that in Cathedrals and churches, schools and parishes, Masses were being said to commemorate 200 years of Catholic Education enterprise in Australia.

The first Catholic school in Australia was founded in 1820 by Irish Catholic priest Fr John Therry and run by convict and lay person George Marley. The school, which Catholic historians believe was in Hunter Street, Parramatta, taught 31 students. By 1833, there were 10 Catholic schools in the colony. Now, after 200 years, Catholic schools have grown to educate 777,000 students in 1,755 schools across the country and employing over 100,000 teachers and staff. It's a significant story and I began my welcome to our College Mass with a message from the Prime Minister who was at Mass at the same time in Sydney Cathedral.

Whilst there was an historical significance about the Mass it was also about us and the joy of being together. Father Jimmy made sure that we understood that. We gathered for prayer and to unite in care for one another, and for fun. We gathered to celebrate Eucharist. Thanksgiving. Together. It was a true Feast Day and we even had a sausage sizzle. It was about a spirit of unity and a sharing of joy. The students were beautifully involved and I delighted in the enthusiasm and reverence.

After a shared barbecue lunch, and the Benedict fun of roaming together throughout the Bosco grounds, we joined in games on the Bosco oval. Year level groups were combined. New alliances were made between age groups. Competition and rivalries were created and then laughter and competition began. Balls were rolled, batons carried, races were desperately won and lost by everyone. I kept saying to the big

ones "don't teach the little ones to cheat". They laughed at me and said 'it was too late!' There was a simplicity in the gathering and a generosity in the involvement. The mentorship of the seniors was wonderful. The Year 12s gently encouraged the Receptions. That was a joy. The teachers organised superbly. Our hearts were touched and the spirit of the school was energised.

Sorry Day

We celebrated National Reconciliation Week with all Australians last week. We were part of a consciousness that acknowledges and raises awareness of the history and continued effect of the forced removal of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people from their families, communities and culture.

The dates between May 27 and June 3 commemorate two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey – the anniversaries of the successful 1967 referendum and the High Court Mabo decision. Our College offered prayers and created symbols and we tried to gather together in an assembly but that beautiful rain kept us apart. Farmers rejoiced as we tried to work out how to get our 900 students to a specially prepared outside venue.

We have a commemorative Indigenous Garden in the middle of the school. A campfire had been set up, flames were flickering, and we were supposed to surround ourselves in a smoking ceremony and gather in solidarity with first nation people. It was just too wet and so we

had ceremonies in the two gymnasiums. What was important was the presence of Lindsay Thompson a Nukunu elder. He offered us a Welcome to Country and gave us a deeper understanding of the importance of the land and the respect that is needed. We were very grateful. We stood quietly and in reflection. This was important.

Confirmation

The Sacrament of Confirmation is held for the St Mark's community on Pentecost Sunday. It is a wonderful celebration of faith and a moment of great dignity. The Cathedral is packed with family members and friends. There are dozens of nervous Year 7s. Teachers watch on in care and pride. It is a time of great liturgical symbol and a deep prayer of commitment. I was particularly grateful for the welcome and warmth of Bishop Karol who conducted the service. There was a significant support for our Confirmandi – our Year 7s. It was School, family and Church coming together really well.

Our Year 7s begin the journey towards Confirmation in their classes months before. It was a time of learning. There was a theology to understand and a Church history to learn. The lessons were a time of discernment and organisation. The students think about a Saint and the values that the Saint represents. Those values become their goal. The students think about a sponsor and the kind of person who has qualities that are important. They invite their sponsor to support them. They learn about great liturgy and the students have to understand how to present themselves to the Bishop and how to respond to a ceremony that is 2000 years old. It is a time of family and a parent night has a particular unity when plans are established and banners are made. It is a time of prayer and the students attend a retreat in anticipation of the moment of commitment.

The Confirmation service itself is grand. People arrive in big numbers. The colour theme is red. The organ is loud. The hymns are beautiful. People dress up. The rituals are full of symbol, and it is a long and magnificent service. Many candles shimmer. The Bishop speaks and prays ancient words. The Confirmation is a time for a 13 year old to stand up publicly, speak of faith, join together in confidence about faith, knowing the warmth of a sponsors hand on their shoulder and the love of a family in the seats behind. It was impressive.

Visit by the Minister

The Minister for Education, Mr John Gardner, and Dan van Holst Pellekaan, the Minister for Energy and Mining, visited the College the other day. It was a quick tour of the Bosco campus which included a chat about our particular culture and the way learning and community unfolds in our College. I was most fortunate to have College Captains Quinn Lane and Flynn Hayes with me. They are outstanding ambassadors and the Ministers seemed to delight in the insight and conversation they had with the students.

We walked the grounds and entered classrooms. There was much that was

interesting going on. Smiling students looked up from work and greeted the Ministers. Teachers spoke about the content of the lesson and students smilingly, nervously, answered questions. There is such a deep respect for visitors with our students. It is impressive. As we toured, there was the quiet of a chemistry lesson and the noise of a Phys Ed lesson, Year 12s studying and Year 8s bustling and lots in between. It was fantastic. I was proud and we finished the tour at 3.20pm just along side the bus pick up zone. My political agenda was about buses and options and costs for our long distant travellers. The Ministers discussed how they could support our families and I expressed a gratitude at the subsidies that exist at the moment. There were some final words and a goodbye. I think that the Ministers will remember a gracious and welcoming school with outstanding young people and some beautiful facilities.



Agriculture students visit Kangaroo Island

Year 12 Agriculture students visited Kangaroo Island recently to explore industry and business. The students visited Cooper's Seed Potato and Sheep Farm, Emu Lavender Farm, Bellavista Farm, Emu Ridge Eucalyptus, Clifford's Honey Farm, Parndana School Aquaculture Centre, Bolto Partners Farming (Wool), Flinders Chase National Park and Seal Bay. In a class discussion following the trip, the students made the following comments:

"It was really interesting to see the landscape and farming practices in Kangaroo Island. Farm production changed so much within a few kilometres, one farmer would be a specialist bee- keeper and the neighbour a potato farmer."

"All of the farmers we visited and talked to were all highly educated and proactive in their businesses. We learnt heaps about farming as a business, rather than a lifestyle. We were very fortunate that they were all more than happy to share their personal and business experiences with us."


