In the past I have written at this hay fever time about the avenue of jacarandas that signal the completion of the Year 12 academic year. In my early years of teaching, now so many years ago, my first 'headmaster' observing that splattering of purple haze along a boulevard would say "When the jacarandas come out the Year 12s have gone". There is something profound and enduring about that recurring truth. The seasons roll on. The Year 12s conclude. As the footpaths are stained with the wispy purple of the jacaranda flower the Year 12s are quietly focussed on a computer and finishing that last assignment. They may be shuffling nervously, fidgeting and waiting every morning and afternoon outside the Examination Room. Their lockers may be gradually emptied. There is a bit of paper or a superfluous book in some. This is a reminder of them and we have a tradition at St Mark's that the Year 12 lockers have a brass plate with the students name on them. There is a long collection of brass plates with great names past on the inside of the locker. We get to remember the generations of students who made that locker their own space. Sometimes the locker door swings idly and empty. The names glimmer in the sun and a long year's effort is just a scrappy memory. The 12s have gone. The jacarandas are out. They have waved goodbye. I have been very confident in the way in which they have taken on the challenge of exams and assignments. I have been proud of the manner in which we celebrated their contribution. The student car park is almost empty. The Year 11s are finding a spot to sit. Graduation tickets have been sold. We miss them already.

One Year and the Installation of the Bishop

Our new Bishop arrived from Poland one year ago and entered our Port Pirie world amidst the horror and unpredictability of COVID. We celebrated with Mass last week to honour his

anniversary of installation as the 11th Bishop of Port Pirie. I attended the ceremony at the Cathedral with members of the Parish. I feel very grateful for the deep interest the Bishop has in the College. We seem so fortunate to have the unending energy of Fr Jimmy in support and the Bishop who smiles and affirms. Sandra Hewson Visit

I had a chance to show our new Principal, Dr Sandra Hewson, around the school last week. We went into classrooms and looked at developments. We met students and said hello. They seemed a little in awe of this new important person and of course were curious and always polite. There was a friendly chat and easy connection. What struck me though, was the way the staff spoke in response to the camp. The students were brilliant even if the weather tested. The students were cooperative and they worked generously together. They didn't flinch at the challenges and there was a great spirit of unity. They were flexible. Everyone was tired and everyone knew that they had shared a really important experience together. I felt

I couldn't understand their rules of their scoring, but I could understand the noise and the teasing, the smashing hits and the cheers of triumph at a catch. Somehow the students organised themselves without too much dispute. It was a great camp for them. There was a very strong cohesion created in the group. They were clearly grateful for the experience. I watched in admiration as the teachers gently guided and respectfully encouraged. The Year 8s were in good hands. It was those cricket rules that confused!


Reconciliation
