Community Voice: We are Listening

Over the next few newsletters this term, I will explore some of the data we have collected over recent months and share how this data is informing the development of our next three-year Strategic Plan. In addition to the enormous amount of academic data collected about student achievement, community surveys provide feedback on how we are doing, and inform what we could do better. Last year, Catholic Education initiated an annual Living Learning Leading Survey in Term 3; a parent satisfaction survey was conducted in Term 4, and last term, parents, students, old scholars and staff had an opportunity to contribute to shaping our future vision and mission through online consultation. Thank you for contributing to these surveys as they provide valuable insights into the College's performance in areas of Catholic Identity, Teaching and Learning, Community and Resourcing. I have sympathy with one survey response that suggested surveys are a waste of time as sometimes it seems data is collected, and the community hears nothing about the results! Rest assured that community voice is being heard, and over the next few weeks you will see how this is leading to actions informing ongoing improvement.

For this week, I will start with Catholic Identity and its connection to our Vision and Mission. This was the major focus of our workshops on the Student Free Day at the beginning of term. Aligned with the Living Learning Leading Framework that guides our practices, Catholic identity is experienced within a culture of dialogue in an inclusive school community. Our goal is that students and staff experience Catholic faith, liturgy, culture, and Tradition in ways that are contemporary, authentic and meaningful. Added to the surveys mentioned earlier, staff also reviewed data from the Enhancing Catholic Schools Identity Project surveys that the community contributed to last year.

Interpretation of the data identified some clear strengths in our community including broad commitment to tolerance and openness, embracing difference and diversity; strong faith involvement by primary students; and the importance of Gospel values as a basis for moral education. That we are a Catholic school is evidenced and widely recognised by the symbols, rituals and faith experiences experienced by the community including liturgies, Feast Day Masses and Religious Education as a core component of our curriculum.

In this experience, however, students, parents and staff have identified some challenges. These include increasing disinterest in Religious Education and faith experiences in older students, a perception that Catholicism, although a preferred approach, is something just to be respected and tolerated in the same way as other faiths and approaches, and a lack of connection between faith, values, and other aspects of school life. As a Catholic College under the governance of the Catholic Church, it is important that we maintain a strong Catholic identity, whilst respecting and

responding to community voice. Our next step is to identity four or five priority goals from a range of suggestions and recommendations, which included:

- Talking further with students about what would make Religious Education and faith experiences and celebrations more engaging
- Developing a mature vision of Catholic education for older students, embracing doubt and struggle in a culture of open conversation
- Focusing on social justice and community service as an extension of Catholic practice
- Further developing connections to the Parish community
- Placing emphasis on ecological awareness, sustainability and looking after our planet
- Creating an Identity Formation Team for a collaborative approach to improvement and practice
- Promoting and supporting youth led activities
- Sharing more information with parents about the Religious Education curriculum, and the meaning behind some of our practices
- Using real life events to explore what it means to be Catholic, or to live Gospel values.

Closely connected with Catholic Identity is our Vision and Mission. Survey responses are greatly assisting us to shape contemporary vision and mission statements that fuse tradition with contemporary ideas and practices. A school's vision statement generally outlines its values and provides a clear overview of the ethos of the school. Mission statements on the other hand focus on what we are doing to achieve the vision. Both should keep us accountable to our core purpose.

Community responses about the values that are evident and desired were very similar. Common values identified included respect, kindness, compassion, resilience, honesty, integrity, empathy, sense of community, equality, persistence, and curiosity. Parents share similar hopes for their children and acknowledge that developing desired skills and qualities is an exercise in working in partnership. Overwhelmingly, parents have told us that they want schooling to

develop confident, brave young people, who are resilient, respectful, tolerant, and compassionate, able to think beyond themselves and have a sense of service to the greater good.

Parents voiced a strong desire for the development of life skills such as financial management, workforce skills and understanding society. It is important that students are literate, numerate, prepared for life beyond school, and can follow a range of pathways successfully. Our purpose should include developing inquisitive, curious students able to think critically and ethically, and solve problems. Parents also expressed a desire to see a focus on growth mindset, understanding that failure is part of the learning process, and that success needs a strong work ethic, good self-management, excellent communication skills, a sense of worth and a grateful heart.

Students spoke of the College's purpose in facilitating improvement in individuals and society at large, providing a safe learning environment, and teaching them to be

good learners and moral citizens, able to care for each other, the environment and be better people in and outside of school. Students recognised that schooling is part of a life-long journey of discovery, and that it lays foundations for further education and self-growth; they expressed a desire to try new things, have opportunities to develop leadership skills and be encouraged to have a strong academic focus so they can become the best they can be.

The connections to our values are strong and the data has provided rich information to help shape our new Vision and Mission and enhance our Catholic Identity. Sincere thanks to all who contributed in some way. One of our goals is to provide opportunities for community voice and student agency and we have made an excellent start. Surveys provided many more suggestions in relation to teaching and learning, uniform and personal responsibility, and I look forward to sharing these soon. Please be assured that we are listening, and the future of St Mark's College is in all our hands.

St Mark's staff recognise the unique challenges facing our students today as they make their future career plans and struggle with the demands of their busy lives. It is this time of term when students, particularly our Year 11 and Year 12 students, start to feel the pressure of the workload. I would like to take this opportunity to highlight 5 key areas that will support your child in keeping on top of their workload.

- Attendance: For students to be successful in their studies they must be present in all classes. If your child is feeling stressed or overwhelmed, it is important that they continue to attend every day. At times, they may want to stay at home to 'catch up' on work but it is important that you know that doing this often places the individual further behind.
- Attitude: A positive attitude and commitment to learning goes a long way. It is important that students listen to their teachers and follow their advice to be successful in their learning. When engaging in conversations with your child about their day, and their learning, it is important to keep the conversation positive and focus on small achievable goals.

- Ask for help: Asking for help is encouraged and will often help settle any anxiety being experienced. I encourage parents and students to reach out to their teachers and ask for help
- **Study Routine:** To be successful students must be committed to doing the necessary study after hours. A sound after hours study routine is key to staying ahead of the game.
- Time Management: For students to keep on top of their study workload, they must make study and homework a high priority, however, this needs to be balanced with sport and other recreational activities. This is just as important! This may mean that they need to reassess their other commitments e.g., part time work and social media etc. Our St Mark's staff are committed to working with your child, supporting them as they manage the workload and develop their study and time management skills.

We are committed to working with you and your child. There is no doubt that school can at times be challenging. Please do not he sitate to contact the College should you have any concerns about your child's wellbeing or learning.



Donations of bread bags and tags can be made by sending them in to your child's classroom teacher or dropping them into the office.




