Living the Good Samaritan Tradition

You may wonder where some of the names come from that are associated with St Mark's College. We are a Catholic school that operates with two charisms, the Sisters of the Good Samaritan of the Order of St Benedict, and the Salesians of St John Bosco. In my last newsletter I wrote of the Salesian Strenna which invites us to explore 'the dream that makes you dream'. The Salesians arrived in Port Pirie in 1956 and established Salesian College as a boys school, but prior to their arrival our school already had a strong, inspiring foundation laid by the Sisters of the Good Samaritan.

John Bede Polding, born in Liverpool, England in 1794, was a founder of the Sisters of the Good Samaritan. After his parents died, he was cared for by his uncle, a Benedictine monk. Drawn into the religious order, Polding was ordained in 1819 and arrived in Australia in 1835 as Bishop of New Holland and Van Diemen's Land. When he died in 1877 his funeral was attended by over 100,000 people, a testament to his compassion and love of the Australian people. One of our Houses is named Polding.

In 1857, Mother Scholastica, a Sister of Charity, worked with Archbishop Polding in Sydney to establish the first congregation of religious women founded in Australia – the Sisters of the Good Samaritan. Their work supported destitute women and they sought to provide Catholic education for children. St Mark's College was first established in 1878, but the Good Samaritan Sisters became responsible for the school in 1890 following an invitation from the Bishop of Port Augusta, Dr John O'Reilly. It was the first foundation of the Sisters of the Good Samaritans outside of Sydney, and apparently, within days of arriving in Port Pirie 'they were teaching over 100 children and enduring the intense heat'. As our website says 'The Sisters established schools at Gertrude Street, Solomontown, Crystal Brook and Risdon Park. For sixty years they carried the torch for Catholic education in Port Pirie'.

The legacy of the Sisters of the Good Samaritan Sisters lives on through the Benedictine tradition at St Mark's College. We all know the story of the Good Samaritan told in Luke 10:29-37, where a man who was attacked by robbers was ignored by passers-by until a Good Samaritan stopped to help and then paid for his care. It is important to remember that Jesus and the Gospel are the inspiration for both our Good Samaritan and Salesian traditions. Now we are in the liturgical period of Lent, students are learning of the value of supporting others throughout the world and raising money for Caritas, but being a Good Samaritan is not predominantly about fundraising; it is about small words and actions that lift and support people daily, in our homes, our school and our community.

We are thankful for the wisdom and teaching of the Sisters of the Good Samaritan, and the Salesians of St Don Bosco, and I hope we are living these traditions authentically.

Shrove Tuesday

Shrove Tuesday or Pancake Tuesday is a time of preparation for the traditions commonly associated with the Season of Lent: prayer, fasting and almsgiving.

- PRAYER: In WRAP, the Home Groups spent some time in reflection on the significance of the day and praying together.
- FASTING: Pancakes are associated with the day as a means of clearing out the pantry and consuming many things that won't be used during Lent. At the Bosco Campus, Mr Ellis was assisted by Year 9 and 10 Religion classes during Tuesday to cook, prepare and serve pancakes to our 7-12 classes. Students braved the strong winds to buy pancakes with a variety of toppings for a gold coin donation.
- ALMSGIVING: The money collected amounted to \$173.85 which will make a good start to the College's Project Compassion fundraising campaign.

At Benedict Campus, students came together for an R-6 Liturgy at which Lenten promises were placed in in a special basket as an offering to God. Students also learned about the work of Caritas Australia and each class collected a fundraising box for Project Compassion. Several classes made a great to start to their Lenten almsgiving by making gold coin donations to Project Compassion while enjoying some delicious pancakes.

Ash Wednesday

Early on Wednesday morning, our Year 12 Home Groups made their way, by bus, to the Cathedral for an Ash Wednesday Mass. During the Mass, ashes made from palms used on Palm Sunday were blessed and used to mark the foreheads of the congregation. This is done as a sign of our own mortality and an opportunity to reconnect with God through his mercy, forgiveness and love.

Year 12s returned to the College with ashes to pass that blessing on to their fellow students in House Liturgies. In turn, Year 12s marked their House members with ashes on their foreheads in a symbol to connect with their communities. The liturgies were also opportunities to launch the College's Project Compassion fundraising campaign, assisted by Year 9 representatives from each House. Faith and Mission



Benedict Campus gathered for an Ash Wednesday liturgy led by Deacon Gary Stokes. We reflected on ways we can grow closer to God through the Lenten practices of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Each student was marked with an ashen cross by their teacher or the Deacon to symbolise the beginning of their Lenten journey.

Year 11 Sacred Spaces Excursion

As part of their Spiritualities, Religion and Meaning (SRM) subject, the Year 11 classes toured some of Port Pirie's major religious buildings. Students remarked on seeing a stark contrast between the sacred spaces of different faiths and denominations, but also common aspects as well.

In the Greek Orthodox Church, one marvelled at the colour and artistic detail in iconography depicting Jesus, Mary and the Saints. They lined the walls, and even the ceiling!

Familiar to many at St Mark's College, the Catholic Cathedral still revealed mysteries and hidden significances in the architecture and religious objects used for worship, prayer and devotion. Students also heard the sounds of the Cathedral Organ, even if only for a short time.

The Port Pirie Mosque (or Masjid) was another place quite unfamiliar to many, however, the welcoming and introduction to Islamic faith and worship allowed students to understand the simplicity of a building where prayer to Allah (God) should be the only focus.

We would like to thank our generous hosts at each site we visited, and intend to make good use of the information we gathered for our first assessment task.

2024 has begun well with our classes taking the first week to establish relationships with peers and teachers. Each class has formed their own class routines as well as exploring what our school expectations are. It is obvious when I walk around the school that each class is settled and calm. This is greatly due to the dedication each teacher has to their profession and I thank them greatly for a wonderful start to the school year.

Each year is important for your child's learning journey, however one of the biggest years of growth is from our Reception students. Each class settled well allowing teachers to form strong relationships with their students and display their care.

This week I have been lucky enough to spend some time in Reception Yellow to find out how their first month of school has been going. These Reception students have been busy learning what school life at St Mark's College is all about. They have learnt their class routines and display them very well by making good choices for their learning. When I asked the Receptions what they have been doing in their classroom Kooper told me "we are learning about numbers and letters". The Receptions have begun their InitiaLit program where they will learn the essential core knowledge and strong foundations to become successful readers and writers.

Heidi told me that they have been doing lots of playing and learning and at school "We always share".

Henry and Alexander told me they are loving going to OSHC after school. The new Director Tara has lots of fun activities for students.

Lawson is enjoy PE with Miss Hier. His favourite thing is Pop Up Tag.

Ava told me they have been learning about feelings. She was able to tell me that there are "Blue, Green, Yellow and Red". The Receptions have been learning about the Zones of Regulation. This program is designed to teach students about self-regulation and emotional control. Miss Lethbridge is teaching her class that they experience a vast range of emotions throughout their school day, and what each zone feels and looks like. Ava said "we want to be in the green zone most of the time, however it is okay to be in the blue zone and have a good cry sometimes".

Learning what is expected at school is a huge element to starting school. These Receptions were able to tell me some of our school rules:

- If someone hurts you tell a teacher.
- If you see someone hurt ask if they are okay
- No running, we use walking feet when we are inside.
- No yelling inside, only yelling outside when you are playing.
- Don't go past the yellow line
- When sitting on the floor, we show listening behaviours (looking, listening, eyes looking, lips together and hands to yourself).
- We always use safe hands.
- When we finish our work we put the rubbish in the bin, pack up the pencils and push our chairs in.

Hi, my name is Kate Elmendorp and I am the Year 7-9 Leader of Learning at Bosco Campus. I wanted to talk with you about NAPLAN which is coming up in the next few weeks.

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) which is coming up in March, is an annual assessment for students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9.

NAPLAN can be met with some anxiety from students and families. We want to reassure our community that we are here to support you through the process. If you have a child in Years 3, 5, 7 or 9 we encourage you to check in with them to see how they feeling about NAPLAN. If your child is feeling nervous or anxious, don't hesitate to contact their class teacher at Benedict, Home Group teacher at Bosco or myself.

NAPLAN

National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy Information for parents and carers

- All students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 in Australia do NAPLAN tests in March each year.
- NAPLAN tests students' skills in reading, writing and maths.
- The test questions are presented in Standard Australian English dialect.
- Students read some of the questions and listen to others with headphones.
- The tests will get easier or harder, depending on how students are going in the test.
- Students do four different tests. The names of the four tests are:



- Students in Year 3 will do the Writing test using pencil and paper. Year 3 students will answer the other test questions on the computer.
- Students in Years 5, 7 and 9 will answer all their test questions on computers
- Teachers will help students get ready for NAPLAN tests.
- Schools will get their students' results. The school will then give parents/carers a report showing their own child's results.
- Parents/carers can talk to the teacher about these results.
- NAPLAN shows how students are going all over Australia. People who work in the Australian Government, state and territory education authorities and schools use NAPLAN results. The results let them see which schools are doing well and which schools might need help.

These will be focussed on building student confidence and look to assist in student understanding.
