Congratulations on reaching the end of Semester 1!

As I shared with Bosco students in assembly last week, I've been a teacher for many years and a principal now for almost 10 years. In that time I've seen many things about school stay the same, and many things change, not always for the better, particularly involving the challenges that young people face in building their skills and confidence, managing technology, which isn't always used for good, and navigating relationships, which is sometimes the hardest thing we have to learn as we get older.

I asked students the question 'What is a school?'

At first glance, the answer seems obvious. A school is a building with classrooms, teachers, students, desks, and whiteboards. It's where we go to learn maths, science, history, English and can choose a range of subjects for interest and for future careers. But if we stop there, we're only scratching the surface.

A school is not just a place — it's a *community*. We are a community of diverse people, but we have St Mark's College in common, and working or studying at St Mark's means commitment to our vision, mission and expectations. Our community is where friendships are formed, where ideas are shared, and where we begin to understand the world and our place in it. It's where we learn not just facts, but values — respect, responsibility, and resilience in life and in our learning.

A school is a *partnership*. It's a shared effort between students, families, and educators. Students bring curiosity and effort. Families provide encouragement and support. And together, we all share the responsibility of nurturing learning and wellbeing.

As we come to the end of this term, I want to take a moment to say **thank you** to everyone for playing their part in this partnership. Whether this term felt like a sprint or a slow climb, progress in learning, respectful interactions with others and with the expectations of being a member of the community, are what matters.

In our final week of term, Year 10s engaged in Work Experience and were reminded that expectations in school are no different from those in the workplace. Rules and expectations are not in place for the sake of control — they are implemented and enforced to help us relate to each other with respect, to create a safe and supportive environment, and to make sure everyone has the best chance to learn and succeed.

When I ask myself again, what is a school, I know that it is so much more than it used to be when I went to school. But most importantly, a school, this school is *ours*. It belongs to all of us — students, teachers, staff, and families. Each of us plays a part in making it a place of kindness, growth, and opportunity.

As we conclude the term, our Year 12s have stepped away from the daily grind of study and engaged in reflection and contemplation on all that is important in their lives and futures. I thank our Retreat Team for their efforts to provide such a meaningful experience for our young people.

Our Year 10s have had a taste of working life this week. We are grateful to all of the organisations who have supported them in their first steps along the way to their future pathways.

Helping Children and Teens Respond to Friendship Issues and Bullying

I was honoured for the College to host a Parent Engagement Evening organised by Catholic School Parents SA and facilitated by Madhavi Nawana Parker from Positive Minds last week.

Building Respectful Friendships for Emotional Wellbeing

Madhavi emphasised the importance of nurturing respectful and healthy friendships to support children's happiness, confidence, and resilience. She highlighted that both children and teenagers are constantly learning how to manage social dynamics. They have their L plates on and are navigating interactions with peers who each have a unique personality and perspective. As adults we play a vital role in modelling calm, positive relationships and modelling empathy, emotional intelligence, and coping skills to our young people in order for them to develop these skills too.

Understanding and Addressing Bullying

Madhavi defines bullying as intentional cruelty involving a power imbalance and repetition. She offered practical advice for parents and educators, including how to respond if a child is bullying or being bullied by others—stressing that calm, empathy, and a focus on repair supports good outcomes.

Fostering Optimism, Connection, and Contribution

Madhavi discussed the importance of fostering optimism and positive relational energy through kindness, encouragement, and gratitude. She also discussed working on the "3 Cs" of wellbeing—Connecting, Contributing, and feeling Capable—as key to good emotional health.

Finally, children benefit from diverse friendships, realistic expectations, and opportunities to contribute meaningfully in a range of circumstances. Ultimately, self-esteem grows not from status but from how we treat others, reinforcing the value of compassion and integrity in everyday interactions.

Teaching kids responsibility through organisation

Organisation is more than just tidying up, it's a life skill that helps children manage tasks, time, and belongings. It supports success in school, play, and everyday routines.

Key skills involved in organisation:

- Planning and sequencing tasks
- Managing time and materials
- · Staying focused and completing activities
- Using language clearly to express ideas

Children with strong organisation skills are better prepared for learning and independence. These skills don't develop overnight—they need to be taught, modelled, and supported through routines, visual aids, and consistent expectations.

Responsibility Starts at Home

Helping children become organised also teaches them responsibility. When we encourage kids to pack their own bags, follow routines, or complete simple tasks, we're building habits that lead to independence and confidence. Being organised is crucial in ensuring you manage your personal, work and school life effectively. This will ensure you have enough time to finish assignments, attend sporting matches, hang with friends, and fill your rostered shifts at work. There are many things you can do to help be more organised, such as:

- Use a planner or calendar This will allow you to write down your assignment and test due dates, school excursions, study time and goals to help manage and track your progress. You can even add your work, sport, and other commitments such as chores, music lesson.
- Break down tasks into smaller steps this will make tasks more manageable and easier to complete.
- Keep school stuff organised Ensure you keep all the things you need for school together. Charge your laptop each night and check to see if you need anything important for the next day.
- Create a to do list Make a daily and weekly to do list and check things of as you complete them.
- Limit distractions turn of notifications or put phones away while studying. Use a stay on track app like Focus Keeper or Forest to stay on track.
- Weekly reflection and review Allow 10 minutes a week to review what went well, what might need improving and future planning.
